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Former Erie Priest Anticipates the Release of the Report of the 40th Pennsylvania Investigating Grand Jury.

James Faluszczak, himself a victim of abuse by a priest, and himself still feeling called to the priesthood, left ministry because the Church ignored his claims.



BUFFALO, N.Y., Thursday, May 24, 2018 – "Even as Fr. Martin was molesting me, I maintained my devotions and felt close to God. Out of my experience of prayer and helping others as a teenager, I felt God was calling me to be a priest. I gradually realized that what Martin was doing to me was sick and I was able to break out of it. After I was ordained a priest in 1996, I had a clear sense that I was helping people as a teacher, chaplain, campus minister, school administrator and pastor. Ministry was fulfilling a lot of the time. It was an honor to stand with God's people and offer their prayers to God, and to speak words of consolation and challenge to them. But it became obvious that I couldn't speak for an institution which I now regard as corrupt. The constant reminders of the abuse I experienced drove me to cope by using substances as a form of triage. The constant presence of bishops and diocesan officials who engaged in the coverup, and the presence of other dysfunctional priests in my life, made it impossible for me to be healthy in that environment. It is a source of enormous pain that I had to leave ministry."

Statement of James Faluszczak: "I understand criminals have rights, so I take no exception to PA AG Shapiro releasing the Grand Jury Report to the bishops he investigated. But this was done today without comment from his office, and many of us are hurt and baffled because we don't understand the law.

Victims like myself do not have the same legal representation as the bishops, access to lobbyists and PR firms, or the blind goodwill offered by most people in the pews. We only have each other, so we dig and we talk to media people who are familiar and we educate ourselves. Unlike other criminal proceedings where victims come

forward, we don't have DAs and prosecutors advocating for our needs, communicating with us and protecting us as proceedings unfold.

Most victims, and especially victim advocates, know people who have taken their own lives over this. Many of us have resorted to unhealthy means of triage to be able to carry our burdens. Today's public knowledge that those who engaged in coverup now sit with our material, perhaps for the next month, is jarring on every level. It may have tragic consequences for those who don't have the supports they require.

If the bishops, who are now reading this report with their lawyers and PR advisors, really care about the healing of victims, they will call for its immediate release. They are already on the record saying they will not block it, but they who presided over the coverup don't deserve the report as much as the vulnerable they still claim to protect."
